


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Commissioner Resources – by Mike Allison, Twin Valleys District Commissioner

The Commissioner Library

Commissioners have long relied upon the "Commissioner Field Guide" as the gold standard for a commissioning reference. If you haven't been paying attention (like me), you may be surprised to find that this venerable manual has been retired. The good news is that we have wonderful collection of new and relevant documents for your use. I will be spotlighting manuals over the next couple of months that are critically important.

Manual of the Month: Introduction to Unit Service

This manual is the first document a new commissioner should read. It covers basics of council

/ district / unit structure, and is the basis of the commissioner's job description. At its core, the manual highlights unit service objects:

- Delivering the Scouting promise and ideals to units
- Assisting the unit in membership growth and on-time recharter
- Linking unit needs to council and district resources
- Supporting the unit leaders so they can deliver the best program to their youth

An important subject in this manual is the section about "Unit Service Methods." This section details different methods a commissioner can use to accomplish our desired objectives such as:

- Unit Service Plans
- Unit committee assignments
- JTE
- My.scouting tools
- Recruiting

Next month we will highlight another manual, which describes one such method, "The Unit Service Plan." This is the heart of Commissioner's job structure.

If you are a new Unit Commissioner, download this manual and give it a read. If you are an experienced Commissioner, you should also read this as it reinforces the vision and mission of the Commissioner Corps of the BSA.







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From Stuart Mahler, ACC for Exploring. Did you know that Exploring has two components?

EXPLORING

The Exploring program has two components: Exploring <u>Clubs</u> are for 6th thru 8th grades and they are referred to as participants. Explorer <u>Posts</u> are for 14 year olds thru 20 years old and they are referred to as Explorers.

Clubs and Posts are part of your districts and they need to be serviced just like Packs, Troops, Crews, and Ships. Contacts with Clubs and Posts need to be entered into Commissioner Tools; just as you would with a Pack, Troop, Crew, and Ship.

Commissioners need to service their Clubs and Posts. In Exploring the commissioner role is referred to as Service Team Member (STM). There is a registration code for District Service Team Member. However, it is perfectly fine for a commissioner to service a Club and Post. No need to be an expert in the Club or Post program. Their leadership knows what to do. The commissioner role is to provide information on district and council activities they could participate in. Assist with charter renewals (Exploring refers to this process as "renewals.") Simply providing information and knowing you are there as a resource will benefit them and your district.

Did you also know that Clubs, Posts and their membership counts towards your district's totals?

At a recent Council Commissioner's meeting Council Commissioner Paul Shimotake pointed out there is a number of units in Golden Gate Area Council which have no Commissioners assigned to them.

Currently there are 19 Clubs and Posts in GGAC. Eight of them have a Commissioner or Service Team Member assigned. Eleven of the Exploring units have no one assigned. Could this be addressed? I look forward to it!

Coming attractions: Exploring has commitments from 19 units who have not renewed and will once the pandemic is over. There are two new units coming once the pandemic is over. There are also five lapsed units working on coming back. So, this comes out to thirty-six units that will need commissioners!

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

GGAC Commissioner Tech Support

With National no longer providing Tech support to volunteers combined with the increasing use of technology to drive our programs, we need a consistent approach to providing technical support, education and resources.

Why ask assistance from Commissioner Service?

While some of these functions can be provided through our other district/council structures it seems to fall better under the Commissioner Services for the following reasons:

- The aid is primarily needed at the unit level.
- The need for this aid comes about in evaluation of units and their needs.
- The Unit Commissioner needs access to resources and tools to share with the unit.
- The District Commissioner needs a local go to resource to share with their staff.
- This can and should grow to reach the regional and national level.

This is separate and distinct from a position of assistant for commissioner tools who provides service to commissioners.

How would this be Implemented?

Each District should appoint an ADC for Technology (ADCfT). The ADCfT's shall meet with the ACC for Technology on a regular basis to go over system updates.

The ADCfT's shall regularly update their district commissioners on latest updates and issues. They shall be a resource for their district on tech matters. They shall provide information on technology issues for their district roundtable, newsletters and social media. They will be the first level of support within their district and will liaise as necessary with appropriate people to fix problems.

This position should be filled with someone who is comfortable with technology and has some familiarity with BSA system's. Whatever they don't know we can help them with. Please try to look outside the existing commissioners and find someone who is not doing 37 jobs already.
